SOME MOUNT HAGEN HISTORY -From John Colman

The Lions Club of Mount Hagen was established on 29 June 1966 and the 22nd anniversary of its charter was celebrated recently.

As a Charter Member I can recall some of the early details of the Club. After a number of initial meetings in the Mount Hagen Hotel (now known as the Highlander) the following members were inducted:-(PE is short for Private Enterprise)

The Charter President was, I think, Frank Mollinger - I was President from 1966-67.

The opening membership was 39 - the highest number of Members during the year was 57 and the membership at the end of the first year was 45. Now we have a membership of 17 with an equal mixture of Private Enterprise and Government members, with 95% Papua New Guineans. Since 1976 all of our Club Presidents have been from this Independent Country.

Initially meetings were held fortnightly in the Mount Hagen Hotel and then at the Hagen Park Motel for a number of years. The changeover dinner for my term as President was held in the Mount Hagen Country Club, which was later closed down, sold to the Government and is now the Offices for B.M.S. and the Education Department.

There have been understandably many changes in the town and the Province over the past 21 years and I consider it a great effort by the past and present Members to guide the Club through this period and no doubt there will be other challenges in the future. Thank you for your attention, and keep roaring (as all Lions do).

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HAVE YOU HEARD THAT .....

- Rhum Negrita, that favourite beverage of PNG residents in the early post-war years, is again available in Australia. All the way from Martinique, it is sold at Camperdown Cellars, Wahroonga Cellars and Menzies Holiday Inn in Sydney, and will soon be stocked in Brisbane and Melbourne. Keep a look-out for the "Buka Meri".
- Professor Peter Lawrence that great friend of PNG, is in Royal North Shore Hospital.
- Geoff Masters' trip to Milne Bay with 50 veterans, some of whom were accompanied by their wives, was most successful. They were at the Bay for the 45th commemorative service of the Battle for Milne Bay - which was the first time in the war the Japanese land forces were defeated. The party was given every assistance by local people and a group of PNG Defence Force men who were nearby, while local ex-servicemen also laid wreaths. The service was taped and later played over Radio Milne Bay.

Transport and the trawler for a trip around the Bay was laid on by Provincial authorities. Alatau now has 2 Banks, 10 stores and 3 more being built -- a far cry from my memories of the Bay in 1948!

In Moresby there was a trip to Owers Corner, finishing at the South Pacific Brewery (!!!) then on to the Galley Restaurant for dinner. The Galley is the new name for the old D.C.A. Mess at Konedobu, run by the enduring Lexi Burns.

- From our last issue some may have thought that Trevor Downes was working for the OK Tedi mines, but not so - he's still with Provincial Affairs (the old DDA) at Kiunga. Jeff Rand and Bob Lock also work in the Western Province and other kiaps include Tony Friend in West Sepik, John Corrigan in Chimbu, Des Fitzer at H.Q. - and Fred Haynes who was formerly Secretary of the Department is now floating somewhere around the corridors of power at Waigani.
- Among the changes noticed in Moresby by a recent visitor are the transformation of the old PMF garage and Noel Moloney's building into multistorey office blocks, the Burns Philp store into a supermarket, the Papua Hotel into a disco called the "Pink Pussy Cat" (!!) while the Moresby Hotel has all been demolished except for the tower section.
- As reported earlier Ela Beach is being transformed into a park area, the only building remaining on the beach side are the old Sub District Office, now the local Court House, and the pre-school next door.

On the town side the far corner of Ela Beach Road and Musgrave Street is being used to construct another high level block, and next door is the 3 storey building of the Credit Corporation. Mrs Jewell's old house is being replaced by a 24 apartment block and similar buildings are going up or planned right along Ela Beach Road.

The old Papuan Hotel and Papuan Theatre is to be replaced by the Royal Papuan Plaza Project, which will consist of 2 wings of 10 floors and a central hotel building of 17 floors -- something to write home about in anybody's language.

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AND HAVE YOU HEARD .....

- Changes also at Boroko. The Nita Theatre has become a six-storey office block, and near the end of Angau Drive is the New Garden City shopping complex with FM TV on te 3rd Floor and staff accommodation on the 4th. The Boroko R.S.L. is out of business and up for sale.
- Moresby now has two TV stations, two cable TV stations, and by satellite ABC Channel 2.
- Mrs Ernie Moa'itz was recently elected as Premier of Morobe Province and on doing so became the first woman premier in PNG.
- Robert Suckling elected from a Moresby ward was the fifth European member elected in the last PNG national elections.
