AUSTRALIAN CITIZENSHIP.

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Recently, a young lady, who was born in Port Moresby 28 years ago and lived in Australia for the past 26 years, made application for the renewal of her Australian passport and was asked for proof of her Australian citizenship. She subsequently had to make applic-

cation to obtain this proof.

There are no doubt other persons ex Papua New Guinea with a similar problem so I obtained the following information concerning the current situation from the Department of Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs.

The status of Australian Citizen did not exist before 26 January 1949 when the Australian Citizenship Act 1948 first became law. Before that date people born in Australia were British subjects. In most circumstances these people automatically became Australian citizens on 26 January 1949 and the transitional provisions of the Act specify the way in which various categories of British subjects born before 26 January 1949 automatically acquired Australian citizenship on or after that date.

People born in Papua before 16 September 1975 are Australian citizens by birth unless they became citizens of Papua New Guinea when that country gained independence on 16 September 1975. However, a person in this category applying for an Australian passport, permanent employment in the Australian Public Service, enlistment in the Australian Defence Forces, etc. will probably be required to produce documentary evidence of their Australian citizenship. This can be obtained by applying to the Department of Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs or any Australian mission overseas for a declaratory certificate of Australian citizenship.

People born in New Guinea before 26 January 1949, whose father was born in Australia or New Guinea and became an Australian citizen on 26 January 1949, automatically became Australian citizens on the date of their first lawful entry to Australia as a permanent resident (or on 26 January 1949 if they arrived before that date) if they were British subjects on 25 January 1949. If they arrived in Australia on or after 6 May 1966, there was an additional requirement for them to be British subjects on the date of their arrival. Anyone who believes he/she became an Australian citizen in this or any other way, may also apply for a declaratory certificate of Australian citizenship.

Persons born in New Guinea to an Australian citizen parent on or after 26 January 1949 and Papua New Guinea after 16 September 1975 have been eligible to apply for registration as an Australian citizen by descent. But only people under 18 years of age may make such an application.

The varous application forms are available from any office of the Department of Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs and must be accompanied by the appropriate fee which is not refundable. It is therefore wise to check your eligibility carefully before lodging your application. If in doubt, you should contact the

TOLL FREE LINE TO CANBERRA:

Members living outside Canberra may now contact the Office of the Commissioner for Superannuation by ringing 008 020080. The cost is the same as for a local call. If you make use of this service, first say you are in a Papua New Guinea Superannuation Scheme, give your file reference number and say very briefly what your query is about. This will be relayed to the PNG Section where your file will be retrieved and someone will ring you back. In this teething period this may take some time so if you are going out later in the day ask for the ring-back call for the next morning. I think the Commissioner is to be congratulated on this innovation.

Why?

Undetected and untreated high blood pressure can lead to heart attack, heart failure, stroke or kidney disease.

But I'm still young!

Age is no safeguard. People of any age can have high blood pressure, but if you are over 25 years of age you are doubly at risk.

What is blood pressure?

Blood 'pressure' is the pressure of the blood in your arteries as it is being pumped around your body by your heart. Blood carries oxygen and nutrients to your body and carries away waste products. The pressure of the blood varies from minute to minute and from day to day in response to the demands of everyday living, but after rising always comes back to normal.

How do I know if I have it?

Usually you don't! That's one of the dangers of high blood pressure, it has no symptoms. The only way to be sure is to have it checked by a doctor. Can it be treated?

Yes! For most people there are 3 simple ways to reduce high blood pressure. These are:

A balanced diet Salt reduction Weight reduction

Other people may need medication in the form of tablets. Even so, by following the three suggested measures, the dose of medication needed may be reduced. Will I be able to stop treatment?

No! Many people mistakenly believe that once their blood pressure goes down they can stop treatment. This is wrong and could be dangerous. Treatment for high blood pressure should only be stopped on the advice of your doctor. How can I find out more?

P.N.G. TITBITS:....

 Papua New Guinea will send sixty of the nation's top student athletes and swimmers to the Third Pacific School Games in Sydney from 1st to 10th December, 1988.

- Papua New Guinea sent a team of 24 to the Seoul Olympic Games 5 officials, 8 athletes, 2 boardsailers, 3 weight-lifters, 2 shooters, 4 boxers. None gained medals, but 4 broke PNG records.
- At least 75 people were killed in a massive landslide which occurred in the Kiapit area some 150km north-west of Lae on 6 September. The landslide covered between 15 and 20 sq. kilometres of mountainous terrain which left 616 homeless, as one village was covered in the slide and two others badly damaged in one of the country's worst natural disasters
- Burns Philp began operations in Port Moresby in 1891 "and has been fleecing officers ever since" according to one informant. Now it is 72% nationally owned. Within five years National Equities Corporation will take out the remaining shares.
- Developers of the Porgera Gold Mine have presented the Government with the final feasibility study of the project. The mine will be both underground and open cut during its 20 years' life, an estimated 54m tonnes of ore reserves. The study estimates that the National Government will receive about K500m, the developers K490m, the Enga Provincial Government K41m and K2.5m to the Porgera landowners. A total of 1,200 workers are expected to work the reserves.
- Oil Exploration Company PPL announced an oil strike in the Hedinia 1X well of a flow of 3330 barrels of oil and 2.85 million cubic ft of gas a day. The company now has three oil wells located South West of Mount Hagen.
- After ten years of successful tea production British Company McLeod Russell Holdings Ltd has sold its 250 acres of tea and 760 acres of coffee in the Western Highlands to Paga 29 Pty Ltd. The Plantation produces 2,200,000kg of tea each year of which 80% is exported.

P.N.G TITBITS.....

- The Bank of Papua New Guinea has awarded a K21m contract to construct a new eight storey building adjacent to the present Bank building on Douglas and Cuthbertson Streets, Port Moresby.
- Air Niugini plans to start operating two new routes. Port Moresby to Townsville via Cairns and a non-stop service between Kieta and Cairns. It also announced plans to have more international services travel direct to centres in the country such as Nadzab, Madang and Wewak.
- PNG and Australia have signed a five year agreement for a \$10m project-tied aid to help the Civil Aviation Department. The money will pay for air traffic control and navigation training and equipment to improve the Department's capacity and efficiency.
- PNG groups have been in Australia helping in various Bicentennial celebrations
 . HMPNGS Aitape and Tarangau and crews took part in the Naval Salute in Sydney on 26 September-4 October.
 - . Members of the PNG Defence Force participated in the Army Tattoo which toured Australia in August and September.
 - . The Raun Isi theatre group from Wewak performed in Wellington and Sydney, and were in Parramatta for its 200th Anniversary on 2 November.
 - . The PNG Defence Force Air Wing flew aircraft to Richmond for the Air Show, at which Talair were also represented.

Australia's Ministers for Foreign Affairs & Trade, Defence, and Resources participated in the inaugural Joint Ministerial Forum in Wewak in early November. From this meeting Australia has agreed to help PNG set up a helicopter squadron to improve surveillance of the PNG/Indonesia border. Australia also agreed to send a team of army engineers to help develop roads and other infrastructure close to the border and to increase from four to six the number of coastal surveillance vessels being supplied to PNG under the Pacific Patrol Boat Program. Australia also will sponsor the placement of up to 200 PNG Senior Secondary School students in Australian schools each year, and increase the number of new academic study awards, enabling some of 90 students to study in Australia in 1989.

- PNG Foreign Minister Mr Michael Somare visited Irian Jaya early November for the 8th Annual session of the PNG/Indonesia Joint Border Committee. Talks on a review of the basic agreement on border arrangements, the joint border, survey and mapping program, border administration, conclusion of an arrangement on search and rescue for vessels and aircraft operating in the border region, in the event of accidents.
- All existing laws governing the country's timber industry will be replaced with only one law, and stiff penalties will keep companies from cheating the landowners.
- A new K22m Genera Hospital is planned for Port Moresby. It will be funded by Japan and erected on the present site. It will accommodate 700 patients and will include a new operating theatre, Cancer ward and nutrition centre.
- The Lutheran Shipping Company in Lae has a new container vessel "Wewak". The biggest among its nine ships, it will service all ports between Lae and Wewak and is capable of carrying 25 cargo containers.
- Work on the proposed \$10m Waigani sports complex will begin next January. It is to be built over 24 hectares and will be the venue for many of the sports to be played during the 1991 South Pacific Games. South Korea will provide about \$100,000 worth of equipment.
- PNG's highly rated pavilion at the World Expo 88 in Brisbane earned the country more than Klm from the sale of products, which include stamps, coffee, jewellery and artifacts. Over two million visitors passed through the pavilion.
- A new rattan processing factory has begun operations in the Malahang-Hunta area of Lae. The raw cane comes from the surrounding area. (This must be the third attempt at least to make rattan pay).
- The Government has allocated over \$13m to its Committee on law and order. The money will be used to implement law and order projects throughout the country in the next four years. Cabinet has also approved budget increases of 10% over the 1988 allocation for all departments, organisations and agencies involved in the prevention of crime. The Minister for Justice and Chairman of the Law and Order Committee, is Mr Bernard Narakobi.
- For the trivia fanatic.....Papua New Guinea has the second shortest flight route in the world. It is from Manari to Naoro in the Central Province, and served by Douglas Airways. The flight, costing K14, runs for three minutes. By the way - the shortest flight is a two minute flight in England.

#### LAST FRONTIERS: THE EXPLORATIONS OF IVAN CHAMPION OF PAPUA by

James Sinclair

This is the story of a man born in Moresby in 1904 but still living in Canberra, who as one the "outside men" carried out a series of patrols from 1926 to 1940 which established him as the last great explorer of Papua.

In his review, Ian Downs points out that Champion's own <u>Across New Guinea from</u> the Fly to the Sepik is in a class above other books on exploration, but by reconstructing tat epic journey with a fresh eye and writing what amounts to a biography of Ivan Champion, Jim Sinclair has produced a new classic. There are two kinds of explorers - those who really know where they are by latitude and longitude, and those who don't. Ivan Champion always knew exactly where he was and the latest aerial photography has only confirmed the geographical observations made on his patrols.

During the last war Champion served with great distinction in the Navy, rescuing soldiers, transporting coastwatchers, piloting U.S. ships and doing front-line hydrographic surveys.

However, the book is not just about patrols and new country. Its vignettes of social life in parochial Port Moresby are fascinating, and its insights into Sir Hubert Murray's policies of peaceful penetration and the protection of the culture and traditions of the people against exploitation are most interesting.

Downs concludes that <u>Last Frontiers</u> "is a book of great merit and historical importance. It is a magnificent production, with maps and photographs which are a credit to the author, the publishers (Pacific Press) and the printers (Boolarong of Brisbane".


#### SOME MORE HELP WANTED -
