EULOGY

FOR THE LATE SIR IGNATIUS KILAGE, GOVERNOR GENERAL OF PAPUA NEW GUINEA
BY SIR WILLIAM PRENTICE
AT A MEMORIAL SERVICE AT ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL, SYDNEY ON 5 JANUARY, 1990

Born in 1940 a village boy in the valleys leading to Mt Wilhelm, the highest mountain in Papua New Guinea, some 6 or 7 years after the first European penetration of the Highlands, Ignatius Kilege grew to be a man who humbly achieved greatness. He was selected to attend primary school in the Western Highlands and at Vuvu in East New Britain - where he continued to preliminary studies for the priesthood at Ulapia Chanel College in 1958. He later did a further year's academic study in Queensland before, in 1963, taking up Theology at Madang Seminary from which he graduated and was ordained priest in 1968.

After some years of priestly ministry in the Chimbu during which he served on various boards and Committees, he sought and obtained release from his vows from Pope Paul VI. He took up other duties which included chairmanship of the Public Service Commission.

At Independence he was appointed Chief Ombudsman, and proceeded to build up a strong organisation in that Commission to his own design. His work there - under difficult conditions - gave tremendous satisfaction; but he declined reappointment for a second term.

On suspension of the Simbu Provincial Government, he administered that Province for some 18 months, and re-established stable government. Later he became principal advisor to the Highland-born then Prime Minister Paias Wingti. He contested the 1987 general elections - finishing runner-up for the Regional Chimbu Seat for Parliament.

He was a man of wide interests which included literature - he had published a novel "My mother called me Yaltep" covering the period of first European penetration of the Highlands (it is not, he told me, autobiographical); and he was prominent in the administration of Rugby League in Port Moresby - it being the principal sport of the country.

His equability and firmness of decision were illustrated for me when I was recalled from circuit to give my vote in a commission as to a most important appointment. (In my absence the vote had been tied between two candidates). I offered my opinion, and sketched reasons therefor. The responsible Minister tried to brow-beat me into changing my mind - indulging in a fierce eyeball and shouting confrontation. Present was Ombudsman Ignatius who merely said quietly but firmly - "All right Minister - you're outvoted - next business please".

Another facet of his character - his abundant humour - was revealed when he came to Sydney only a few weeks ago, a very ill man. He was to undergo visits with professors of medicine, one a PNG man one a Sydney man. Speaking on the phone I asked what were his symptoms. He sounded depressed, so jokingly I said, as he detailed them. "It sounds very much like AIDS to me." I could almost see through the phone the teeth flash, his coal black eyes glint with fire as he shouted "You....." followed by an epithet which in Australian speech can carry meanings from intense anger to the greatest affection. Chuckling, I suggested "Your Excellency - that doesn't sound like proper vice-regal language". I fancy he may have picked up such speech patterns in the seminary! We went on an excursion the next day to Manly, and we made our goodbyes - he knew then he was dying.

Ignatius was a man of great personal dignity, ability, firmness, honesty and sincerity. He evoked affection and respect in all who knew him. He was a true and caring friend - he loved God, his family and his country, with a special feeling of course for his own people the Chimbus.

I had stayed with him and his family on the 3 occasions on which I have returned to PNG since my resigning office as Chief Justice, and I shared the patently happy family life there at Boroko.

He leaves with us his wonderful wife Regina and four fine children; the eldest girl now schooling in North Queensland - the youngest about 2. We extend out sympathy to them in the loss of such a devoted husband and father. PNG has lost one of its most distinguished sons; and as he conferred on me the honour of referring to me as his PAPA - so I too have lost a much loved son.

Ignatius Kilage, Knight Grand Cross of Saint Michael and Saint George, Commander of the Order of the British Empire, Knight of St. John of Jerusalem - you have returned to your Maker. We thank HIM for you and we salute you. Perhaps you will now intercede for us.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA (Margaret Clancy)

Des and I are very much enjoying a six week visit to the Eastern States. We came to Adelaide on the Indian Pacific and drove to Sydney in our own car which also came with us on the train. We will visit Queensland for a week then back to Sydney, on to Melbourne for a week and then drive home to Perth. It's great to catch up with old friends.

Brian Heagney put on a great New Year's Eve Party in his unit high above the Swan River. Brian and his wife Juliana have two beautiful little children, Patrick aged six and Brenna aged four. A very happy family. Brian would like to know - "Where is Peter Sheekey?" (He will find Peter's address in the membership list. Ed.)

We in WA want to see the VALE pages continue. True it's sad but we want to know. I can't let that comment pass without expressing my own sadness about the deaths of Mary Zweck and Dulcie West - both untimely.

Mrs. Eve Ackerman is a new member of the Association. Eve lives in Perth and was the wife of Dr. John Ackerman. They were in Rabaul from 1946 until 1947 and then in Goroka and Wewak until 1951. Eve is anxious to find the whereabouts of old friends and she and Dame Rachel are going to PNG in April in the hope that Eve can catch up with some of the indigenous people she knew years ago.

Terry Hadlow, formerly a PO in the Western District and ENGA (1972-81) and at Adcol Local Government in Moresby, is now a senior officer in the Civil Aviation Authority in Perth.

Gus Bottrill was in the Northern Territory recently and caught up with former PO (SHD) John Kabisch. John is in the Department of Local Government in Katherine and his boss is Mike Press also a former SHD Kiap. Gus reports that Mike Corcoran, ex Fire Chief in Moresby, is now Mine Host of the Old Colonial Hotel in Geraldton (he has been there for quite a few years now).

Cedric Wyatt, ex PNG, is now a very senior officer in Aboriginal Affairs (State Department) in WA.

I met Mike Hess, Lecturer in History at UPNG from 1979-82, and his wife Liz. Liz is a girl from Lake Murray and was adopted by TAMATAI, a Kiwai policeman, who is now retired near Mendi. Liz is a lawyer and is going to practice in Port Moresby when they return to PNG. Liz and Mike have a brand new son named Alfred.

I hear that Jim Jones, formerly Department of Education PNG, is in Perth and with the Department of Education in WA. Will catch up with Jim when I get back.

NORTHERN TERRITORY (Jim Toner)

Jim has been away on long leave (January and February) in UK/USA but, like the good correspondent he is, he sent me some copy before he left, thanks Jim. Ed.

He wrote this about the VALE section: "Of course you must include decent obituaries, so far as you can obtain the details. I'm afraid that the nature of the organisation is such that there will always be need for such a section.

Bear in mind that it may be the last time that readers will see the names in print of people they knew. To dismiss their lives with a two-line entry is not what most wantoks want."

Among those people who have made a successful transition from PNG to NT are Phil and Mary Lefevre who were well known at Rabaul when Phil was with Crown Law there. He is now Master of the NT Supreme Court while Mary teaches at a high school. The Lefevres were prime movers towards the establishment of a PNG Club in Darwin in the 70's but despite their hard work it did not thrive.

Peter Liddle, who was on Nataff HQ staff at Konedobu for years, arrived in Darwin in 1978 and is now Registrar of the Family Court. Legal eagles may recall his wife, Glenda, who worked for Joe Lynch, the Legislative Draughtsman.

Another Kone warrior who has done well is Bob Magin. He endured Ranaguri Hostel and Newtown dongas when he joined Treasury in 1966 but now, as Managing Director, Corporate Services, of the Northern Territory Power and Water Authority, has a pleasant executive home - with pool, of course - in Darwin.

(Bob says that when he joined the NT Electricity Commission it was known as ELCOM. This was unsurprising since Max Dryer - who was a VIP with PNG ELCOM - had much to do with the establishment. However, when the politicians decided to merge it with the Water Branch, staff from both sides took an extremely dim view. They suggested that the new authority be called Combined Utilities Northern Territory but for some reason this title was never adopted).

#### BRIBIE ISLAND QLD (Geoff Masters)

Theo Jagers (refer Vale re death of wife Betty) is something of an artist and is now travelling Australia in a campervan painting and selling as he goes.

Last year the local people, from the area in Papua where the Kokoda Trail Memorial is located, made a claim for K.80,000 for the piece of land on which the memorial is located.

Towards the end of last year, Alf Clarke, Director of Australian War Graves, and official party, were attacked and beaten whilst inspecting Bomana War Cemetery - makes one wonder how safe the war graves are.

Geoff recently spent a month in New Zealand and has some interesting comments about the country:

"A month in N.Z. (if you have been there previously) is far too long. Had 7 days in each centre - Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch - and found that after 3 days I ran out of places to visit. For intending visitors, I suggest that they go it alone and not on a package arrangement. Get the cheapest return fare and upon arrival check out all the hire car people, plenty of leaflets in airports. Get the cheapest car you can, stay at hotels and not motels where possible, they are cheapest and give far better meals and quicker service.

Everything is very dear in NZ, petrol \$1 per litre and a can of beer is \$3.50. Local LION is \$1.75 a pot but I wouldn't call it a beer, Steinlager and Reineck are about the best of what's about. Found that local Returned Services Clubs gave best value for money for meals and drinks.

Old timers would remember TAA Catalina VH-SBV which, after its retirement, was

towed to Jackson's Airstrip and used as fire drill for the PNG fire crew. Well today it's at Wigram Air Force Base in NZ and has been partially restored. A new tail section has been fitted and during my visit the blisters were being fitted and wings restored. From talks I had, it appears it will be a 3-5 year project costing some \$1 million, but well worth it for a great old plane.

10 February, my wife and I, with Fritz and Hildegard Doerr, attended the wedding of Tracy Rigo Granville Sharp. Tracy was the only daughter of Mavis (deceased) and Ern Sharp. Among the guests, who came from all over Australia, were Lloyd Nolann one of Ern's PO's, Roy and Balha Andrews from Melbourne (ex Alotau), Ern's clerk from Rigo Sub-District Office with his wife and son, Dagia (I think their name is Baboma). Also amongst the guests were Ian Rosser and his mother and others whose names I cannot recall. The wedding was held at Windaroo Country Club between Brisbane and the Gold Coast.

Next door neighbour is Kel Chew, who was prominent in PNG for many years.

Our local Parish Priest, Father Scanlon, who spent some years at Sidea, is something of a painter, so I commissioned him to do a painting of Milne Bay from a photo taken from Camerons Plateau overlooking Sandersons Bay and the result is wonderful. Father held a display of paintings at the end of January and my Milne Bay one was amongst those marked 'sold'. It was the talk of the display and is now on the main wall of the lounge room with the PNG national emblem beneath it. It brings back great memories!

Re proposed PNG get together at Bribie Island, numerous people have phoned but we will have to get at least 100 to make it a worthwhile function, so keep that phone ringing.

Ed. Geoff has suggested that we devote some pages to members who would like to recall their days in PNG and would be happy to start it off. Knowing Geoff, his would probably be a 'magnum opus' and take up at least one whole issue! Nevertheless, I think it quite a good idea and we could perhaps do a special edition if there was enough response. What do members think about the suggestion?

#### BRISBANE QLD (Doug Franklin)

Fred Haynes, former Secretary for Department of Provincial Affairs and ex-President of Overseas Staffing Assistance Association, left the Government in 1987 and took up an appointment as Kennecott Rep. for PNG. More recently, British Petroleum PNG have secured his services as their Rep. for the Hides Gasfield Project, which will provide power for the Porgera Project. Lettie is PNG Manager for Cathay Pacific in Port Moresby.

Bob Cottle, DASF 1948-75, is "pretty good" he says, from his home at Clontarf near Brisbane. He was at Aiyura in 1950 with Jo Nitsche's father and went into Kagua on the first patrol in 1957 with Brian Corrigan. Later Bob was stationed at Rabaul for many years where he remembers with longing that a pawpaw cost 10c.

Following mention of John Summers (Dec. 89 Una Voce) Doug Franklin had a call from Bill Buch, Govt. Trawler Skipper 1955-73, who knew J.S. at Manus. He had lost contact for 15 years. Great what Una Voce can do to reunite old friends.

Kieth De Lacy, ex DASF/DPI Education and Training Section Didiman is the Treasurer for Queensland in the new Wayne Goss led Labour Government. Keith holds the seat of Cairns for the A.L.P. in the Queensland Parliament.

(Ed. There was an interesting snippet about Keith in the Qld. Sun Newspaper on 15 February: "Treasurer Keith De Lacy readily admits he is much better at public speaking than he used to be. #### P.N.G. TITBITS

##### Bougainville

Enga Premier, Mr Ned Laina, was in Australia in January as guest of the Commonwealth Government. He said that the Bougainville agreement was drawn up between the mining company and the PNG Government. Local people were not involved and that is where the present trouble started.

He said that in the case of Porgera mine he drew up some proposals where both the landowners and the provincial government were very much involved.

The Enga Government will receive at least 5% equity share and landowners 1% of the mine's production.

Porgera is expected to begin production in September 1990 with an estimated output of 800,000 ounces of gold per year.

##### Port Moresby Fire

The fine former Department of Health building on the corner, at the bottom of Spring Garden Road and Champion Parade, Konedobu, which had been reallocated to Department of Agriculture and Livestock, caught fire on Christmas Eve and burned to the ground. The fire had started in the evening. Thirty five D.A.L. officers lost their offices and more serious, all the office records and files were lost.

##### Beetle Nut

A new Government Order has been promulgated forbidding the chewing of beetle nut in Government Offices.

##### Government Economy Measures

Stringent Special General Orders were introduced last year to offset the effects of losses in revenue from Bougainville Copper. These G.O.s cover the following staffing areas and restrict or forbid new activity: Reclassifications; Retrenchment Payouts; No Reorganisations; Retirements (except for over 60's); Recruitment; Advertisements; Allowances or H.D.A.s. Hours of duty to be checked and enforce sign in/sign out system. No overtime except essential then time off in lieu of overtime pay. No travel allowance. Restricted travel. Officers not working to be sent on six months LWOP. Recreational Leave to be deferred. Leave fares suspended. Contract Officers not essential to be terminated at end of contract. No new consultants. No new computers. No applications for office space.

The Order was signed by W. B. Kanawi O.B.E. Secretary.

### VALE

*"Poignant are all the encounters with death - parents in the fullness of their days, dear friends, great men and women whose images remain vivid and fertile - silent visions. Every one of us has looked into the eye of mortality and endured its wounds."*

With deep regret we record the passing of the following members and friends. On behalf of the Association the Committee extends our sincere sympathy to their families.

Miss. Joyce Dorothy OLROYD-HARRIS (13 January 90)

Joyce was born in 1901 and completed her nursing training at Wallsend Mining District Hospital on 23.3.1927. In 1930 she attended a course in Midwifery and Obstetric Nursing at the Women's Hospital (Crown Street) Sydney. She worked at various hospitals until 26.1.1937 when she left Melbourne on board the "Canberra" for New Guinea. Her first position was at Wau where she stayed until 1939. She transferred to Madang on 31.5.1939 as Snr. Sister where she stayed until 7.12.1941 at which time she transferred to Rabaul as Matron. Her job at Rabaul was to last only 6 weeks as she was taken prisoner by the Japanese in January 1942. She was liberated in Japan on 31.8.1945, 3 1/2 years after being captured.

Joyce returned to New Guinea in 1947 and was to continue her work until her forced retirement due to ill health in 1959.

Between 1955 and 1976, Joyce made a number of trips overseas travelling the world. In 1979 she spent 2 weeks in China and her last trip was in 1986 when she was to experience her first helicopter journey at aged 85. It was not to be just an ordinary helicopter ride but a flight to one of the highest glaciers in Alaska.

In between overseas visits Joyce travelled to all parts of Australia from top to bottom and side to side always learning something from each visit.

In 1980 she attended a residual course in effective communication at the University of New England, returning at a later date for a study on the writings of A. J. Tolkien.

She was active in various organisations and in her church. She enjoyed her trips with the C of E Historical Society and her work with the Harbour Lights Guild of the Mission to Seamen. She was Treasurer of our Association from 1965 to 1979 and was a Life Member and Patron of the N.S.W. Ex Prisoners of War Associated Ladies Auxiliary. She supported the Australian Ballet, The Australian Opera and the Elizabethan Trust. Also the National Parks and Wildlife Service, the National Trust and the Australian Geographic Society. Many charities have benefited financially or in kind from her support. Children's charities were a favourite of hers. M.S. Research, National Heart Foundation and Royal Blind Society are just a few of those who received assistance.

In 1987, though in excellent health, she was forced to leave her home of 26 years at Chatswood. She moved to a larger unit in Epping. After a couple of falls during the winter of 1989 she had nursing care at home and it was suggested that she move to a nursing home for the more constant care. She had another serious fall and moved from the Lady Davidson Rehabilitation Hospital to the Anglican Chesalon Nursing home at Beecroft, during the first week of November 1989. Joyce had another bad fall and passed away 13 January, 1990. Her life should be an inspiration to us all, Joyce we Salute you!

Mrs. Rachel BURT (19 February 90)

Mrs. Burt was the widow of Edward McGain Burt, who was a Medical Technician in PNG until he retired in 1964 and passed away in 1967.



Mr. Kenneth Raymond WILLIAMSON (18 November 89)

Ken was born 17 August 1920 and went to PNG as a Patrol Officer 28 July 1946. After serving for some years in the field service he was appointed Commissioner for Local Government, a position he held for many years until his retirement in 1974 to Tweed Heads in NSW.

It was under Ken's competent direction that local government developed and prospered throughout PNG. He was highly regarded by his friends and his staff. Bob Tebble, who worked with Ken for many years, has written as follows: "I can say honestly that of my 20 years in PNG the most fulfilling and enjoyable were those I spent working with Ken. I always found him helpful and appreciative and I can look back with considerable pleasure on my time in the Office of Local Government".

On retiring to Tweed Heads Ken played some bowls, but I understand his main loves were orchids and opera.

He died in Greenslopes Hospital after a long protracted illness and was cremated at Tweed Heads on 23 November 1989. Most of the Gold Coast residents who were ex PNG HQ Local Government staff were at the funeral, Worcester, Hayes and Bridges and local ex Kiaps Webb, Pegg, Hurrell, Bunting, together with Thelma Leabeater who with Tom was a very close friend.

The service was conducted by an old RN Padre, who came from the same place as Ken, Launceston. Ken was in the Navy and served most of his time in corvettes. Ken is survived by his widow Gloria and their daughter and family.

Miss. Cassandra Robyn GEE (26 November 89)

Cassandra was born in Vuna Pope, New Britain, on 19 August, 1972, the oldest child and only daughter of Ken Gee and his wife Robyn (nee Seymour). She spent the first few years of her life in New Guinea and moved with her parents to Montville, Qld. She received her early education at Montville and later at Kilcoy. She excelled at creative writing and was selected to attend a camp for students with similar gifts. She entered Concordia College in 1985 and successfully completing her year 12 in 1989 she had been notified of her acceptance in the University of New England.

She is remembered by fellow students and teachers as an energetic and self-giving happy individual who was both sensitive and creative. She was well liked for her loyalty, laughter and enjoyment of life.

Cassandra died as the result of a traffic accident near her home in Warwick. Her father and younger brother Michael both sustained serious injury at the time. She leaves to mourn her passing, her father Ken, her mother Robyn, her brothers Kenneth, Michael and Christopher and her grandmother, Lorna Binnie (nee Nicholls, wife of Bill Nicholls, PNG postmaster). (Ken Gee was in PNG for 26 years and was with the Lands Department when he left.)

Sister Jan MARRIOTT (nee Balks) (September 89)

Jan served in the Madang Hospital in the sixties and helped to nurse Freddie Kaad when he was involved in the air crash 3 September 1964 in the foothills of the Finisterre Mountains, near Dumpu in the Ramu Valley. Jan also nursed Freddie on the journey to Sydney where he was transferred two weeks after the crash.

Survived by husband Colin and children Louise and Christopher.

Mrs. Phyllis BARRETT (November 89)

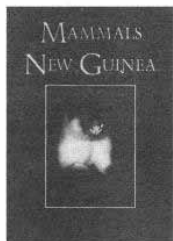
